



# Importing Personal Property Into

## Mauritania

### IMPORTING HOUSEHOLD GOODS AND PERSONAL EFFECTS

#### DUTY-FREE ENTRY IS PERMITTED IF THE FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS ARE MET:

- Household goods are used
- Items are accompanied by a Duty Free Exemption Certificate (when applicable)

#### REQUIRED DOCUMENTS:

- ✓ Packing list
- ✓ Copy of Valid Passport
- ✓ Original rated Bill of Lading/AWB (no express release accepted)
- ✓ Invoices for the electrical and hi fi appliances and for all items bought less than 6 months before the shipment's arrival
- ✓ Resident or working permit or letter from the employer explaining that the client is starting a new contract
- ✓ Non sale certificate (declaration on the honor that the client will not sell the household goods)

#### Notes:

- All containers are subject to a search by customs officials. Be very careful when listing the number of parcels on the OBL to insure an accurate count. Otherwise the customs will assume the shipper has made a fake declaration and will fine him or her.

#### RESTRICTED/PROHIBITED ITEMS:

- Firearms and ammunition
- Illegal Drugs
- Alcohol

#### IMPORTING MOTOR VEHICLES:

- Import taxes depend on the age of the vehicle
- Customs may decide the value of the vehicle themselves if they believe the listed value is fake (they tend to give higher than average values to old vehicles).
- Diplomats may import vehicles duty free
- All documents should be submitted to the destination agent at least 1 month prior to shipment's arrival to avoid long delays and demurrage and storage charges.

#### REQUIRED DOCUMENTS:

- Original Registration Card
- Copy of Passport
- Original Invoice (new car)
- Original OBL/Original AWB
- Resident or working permit or letter from the employer explaining that the client is starting a new contract
- Non Sale Certificate
