

Importing Personal Property Into Bulgaria

IMPORTING HOUSEHOLD GOODS AND PERSONAL EFFECTS

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS:

Non-Diplomats:

- ✓ Copy of International passport
- Copies of the "Blue Passport" local identity paper for foreigners.
- Declaration of vale of the household goods (value should be \$2500 or less)
- ✓ Packing list
- Separate list of serial numbers and brands of the electric and electronic appliances
- ✓ Letter from the employer in Bulgaria, stating that shipper will be working for at least 12 months. Must be in Bulgarian.
- Power of attorney for shipper's destination agent (must be notarized)

Note:

Any paintings that are shipped should be listed and described separately on the inventory.

Diplomats:

- Copy of the diplomatic passport
- Packing list
- Separate list of the serial numbers and brands of the electric and electronic appliances
- Letter from the Bulgarian Embassy stating the shipper's appointed position and period of stay in the country.
- Power of attorney for shipper's destination agent (must be notarized)
- Special customs form demanding permission for duty free import of household goods verified by the Consular Section of the Bulgarian Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

RESTRICTED/PROHIBITED ITEMS

- Druas
- Firearms and Ammunition
- Illegal Drugs
- Alcohol
- Large quantities of medications

IMPORTING AUTOMOBILES:

All imported vehicles and motorcycles are subject to temporary import taxes. Customs guarantee is applicable for the temporary import of the vehicle. The amount of the guarantee is 15-20% on the declared value. Guarantee is reimbursed 100% after the export of the vehicle.

Required Documents:

- Original Registration Card
- Original Ocean Bill of Lading/Original Airway Bill
- Sale certificate or original invoice

IMPORTING PETS:

All pets must be accompanied by a valid Vetrinary Certifacate of health (must include a vaccination history).
