IMPORTING HOUSEHOLD GOODS/PERSONAL EFFECTS, MOTOR VEHICLES AND PETS

HOUSEHOLD GOODS AND PERSONAL EFFECT MAY BE IMPORTED DUTY FREE IF THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS ARE MET:

- Shipper has diplomatic status (must include letter from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs verifying status)
- Shipper works for a registered foreign company and has obtained a valid Laos work permit. Copies of the employer's investment license and business license will also be required.
- Shipper is a returning resident and has been abroad at least 12 months.
- Shipper must be present at Customs clearance.
- Shipment must arrive within 6 months of owner.

Note:

Duty-free shipments are limited to one air and one sea shipment, and can include only one of each type of electrical appliances.

All other shippers may import household goods and personal effects into Laos but they will be subject to duty. The duty amount varies and is often determined through negotiations with customs officials.

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- Original passport
- Original work permit or diplomatic certificate

IMPORTING MOTOR VEHICLES

- Diplomats may import a vehicle duty free, provided he or she obtains a letter from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs verifying diplomatic status and requesting duty free import.
- ✓ Non-diplomatic shippers will find it nearly impossible to import a vehicle due to time consuming procedures and a duty that can be as high as 300% of the vehicle's original purchase value.

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

 Import permit must be obtained prior to importation.

IMPORTING PETS

- Most pets can be imported without a quarantine period.
- Shipper must provide a current health certificate (no more than 7 days old) and a current vaccination card.

PROHIBITED/RESTRICTED ITEMS

- Firearms and ammunition
- Pornographic materials
- Reactionary (politically subversive) materials
